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Battery percentage display android

Android 10 includes some changes to the status bar and the quick settings panel. One is that the battery percentage is no longer displayed at the top of the quick settings, but only an estimate of the time left until the phone dies. Fortunately, it's easy to get the percentage back. The first method is to open the Settings app, tap the Battery section, and turn on Battery Percentage. This will add the battery percentage next to the status bar icon, while keeping the estimate in the quick settings drop-down list. Android 10 with battery percentage enabled If you don't want the percentage to always be visible and you just want the previous functionality to come back, there's another method. Open the Settings app, type health in the search bar, tap Device Health Services, and press the Disable button. This will disable the system feature that generates battery estimation, so Android will revert to just displaying percentages. I assume the Android 10 battery estimate will be one aspect of the update that Samsung and other manufacturers will change, but we'll have to wait and see. Samsung has packed all its Galaxy S20 models with quite large batteries, but they don't have crazy resistance, unfortunately. Samsung Galaxy S20: Turn on the battery percentage in the status bar By default, Samsung only displays an icon to show how much battery you have left before you need a top-off. To get this number by default, you've got to dig through a bunch of menus just to get a number and usage statistics. Fortunately, you can easily turn the battery percentage into the status bar with a simple switch. By entering the Settings menu on the Galaxy S20, you can tweak a lot of how your phone works. In this case, however, we will go to the Notifications section. From there, tap the Status Bar. In this menu, there is a simple switch at the bottom of the list that, when turned on, will display the battery percentage on the Status Bar of the Galaxy S20. In the interest of making checking battery statistics a little easier to access, here's another neat trick. If you go to the Play Store and download a free app called Quick Settings, you can add a shortcut to the battery menu to the quick settings – something that Samsung is shocked isn't offering. After you download the app, tap the side menu at the bottom of the screen, tap Utilities, and then Tap Battery. I know this might seem a little trite, but for users like me, who test the limits of their Android device battery, knowing exactly how much juice is left in the tank is important. Consider this: You are driving a new car and instead of a fuel indicator that informs you exactly how much you have in your tank or batteries, you get a small icon that estimates how much you've left them in a somewhat way. One day, one hour. How far is that going to take me? You wouldn't want that, would you? Not. You want to know exactly how much further you can go before it's time to refuel or recharge. This is especially apropos for busy power users who depend on their mobile devices to get them through a working day. No IT professional wants to work without their trusted digital sidekick, right? This being the case, you might be surprised to find out the developers of Android 10 have decided to disable the battery percentage by default. That means you spend most of the day hoping that your estimate will take you until it's time to turn off the lights. As far as I'm concerned, it was a mistake. Fortunately, it is quite easy to allow this percentage indicator. In defense of developers, the default makes use of the Wellness app to get an estimate of how much battery life remains. This is indicated by a day and time format. However, that is found only in the notification shadow. On the home screen, you'll only get a battery icon that tries to indicate how much battery is left with a visual cue (Figure A). Figure A The default battery icon. It's not until you drag down the notification shadow that you get to see the actual estimate of the remaining battery power (Figure B). Figure B The new battery estimate in Android 10.For some users, that might be a much easier way to know how much battery life remains in the device. However, for those who have been using Android for a very long time, we live and die with this percentage. In addition, we have not yet seen any indication that the Wellness app estimate is on the spot. If it is, great. If not, there is always the percentage indicator to support themselves. And because, once activated, the percentage lives only on the home screen (as when you drag down the notification shade, see the Wellness estimate of battery life), you get the best of both worlds. One exception that some people have to do this is the battery percentage statistics. While the battery charge level can be represented with the standard battery icon, this reading is somewhat imprecise due to its small size. To help you read the battery level more accurately on Android, you can turn on reading the battery percentage that's next to the standard battery icon. The additional accuracy of the battery level can give you additional confidence that your phone's battery will last all day or, on the contrary, it can let you know that you need to manage battery life to prevent your phone from dying before you can charge it. To set up battery percentage reading, you'll need to open your phone's settings app. Note: This guide was written using a Samsung Galaxy S10e, the exact process to allow the percentage of battery can vary on phones from different brands. In the settings app, you need to tap Notifications. On the S10e the notification settings will be third-party at the top. Tap Notifications in the settings app. In the notification settings, tap The Status Bar. The option should be the fourth at the top and the only one without a slider. Tap the Status Bar in the notification settings. Tap the last option in the status bar settings, labeled Show Battery Percentage. Once this setting is turned on, reading the battery percentage should appear almost immediately next to the battery icon. Tap the last entry in the Status Bar settings, labeled Show Battery Percentage. Note: If you're using a phone and this setting isn't in the same place, try using the search functionality in the settings app. The setting to activate the battery percentage indicator should be easy enough to find if you're looking for it. If this doesn't work try to search for battery, this will likely return more results to search through, but should display all battery-related settings. You can activate the battery percentage in Android 6.0 Marshmallow with a somewhat hidden setting, and in 4.4 KitKat and 5.0 Lollipop with a very hidden setting. Display the battery percentage in Android Marshmallow To enable this feature in Marshmallow, you'll need to enable Marshmallow's System UI Tuner, which gives you access to some hidden settings. Drag down the notification shade, and then drag down a second time to display the Quick Settings panel. (You can also drag the notification shadow down with two fingers to reveal this panel.) Find your settings equipment along the top. Press and hold this gear icon for a few seconds until it starts to rotate. Release your finger and you should see a pop-up that tells you that the system user interface tuner has been enabled. Tap the System UI Tuner option in the Settings window that appears, and accept the warning that appears. On the System Tuner page, turn on Show Built-in Battery Percentage. The battery icon will now display the charge level at any time. show the battery percentage in Android KitKat and Lollipop KitKat and Lollipop actually have this feature built in, but the setting is even more hidden. In fact, the setting does not exist at all! The only way to turn it off is with a few ADB commands or the Battery Percentage Activator app in the Google Play Store. You don't need to be rooted or anything to use this, so most KitKat and Lollipop phones should find this works with the instructions below. Open the Google Play Store on your phone (or go to the Google Play Store from your computer's browser) and search for the Battery Percentage Activator. Select the app from kroegerama (there are several apps with the same name). You can also click this link to go directly to the Battery Percentage Activator page on your computer or phone. Click the Install button to install it on your device. (If you do this from a desktop browser, make sure you have selected the correct device from the drop-down list.) After installation, click the Open button that appears (or navigate to the app in the app drawer). Check the Enable Battery Percentage box and restart your phone. After restarting your phone, you should find that the Android battery icon shows how much of a charge it has. There is a downside, though: on some phones, the percentage text is white, the same color as the battery icon. This way, you can only see the battery percentage if the battery is more than half a mesh, so that the white text is on the empty gray background. It's clear this was an unfinished feature for KitKat and Lollipop (probably why it was hidden) but it's still better than nothing. There are a lot of other apps that add battery percentage to the menu bar, but notifications that are not part of Android's built-in battery. We believe that the above solution is best for pre-Marshmallow phones. Keeping an eye on battery life is just the first step: the real trick is to know how to extend your phone's battery as much as possible.
